This is reflective of the shortage of mental health capacity the state of New Hampshire continues to experience. Access to insurance/finanical barriers and access to dental care continue to be among our priority needs, but their position in the top 10 dropped, while physical activity, diet/nutrition and transportation were identified has higher priorites.
